A MESSAGE FROM THE HEALTH COMMISSIONER

Foundations of Public Health

Throughout history, disease outbreaks such as cholera, smallpox, and the plague elicited reactive efforts to protect citizens at risk of contracting the deadly diseases. However, prior to the eighteenth century, epidemic disease was often considered the result of moral shortfalls. Despite this commonly held belief, rudimentary interventions began to take shape with the implementation of isolation and quarantine measures in some European cities in the late 1600's as a response to epidemic disease.



By the early eighteenth century, these practices had spread throughout Europe, and even American port cities were implementing rules for quarantining sick arrivals on ships. While these introductory interventions were helpful in reducing the disease burden of historically deadly epidemics, it was just the infancy of the modern public health system.

What transpired to allow the advancement of the public health system from its roots in the eighteenth century to the current state? Two primary factors have given rise to modern public health: 1. the amassing of a body of scientific knowledge regarding the sources of, and tools to control, disease, and; 2. increased public acceptance of the possibility of controlling disease and the recognition that it is a public responsibility. Prior to scientific breakthroughs that provided empirical evidence as to the cause of disease, the prevailing societal approach to disease was one of resignation and apathy; without a known cause, a clear path for prevention and treatment was not possible. As the body of scientific knowledge grew, particularly in the late 19th century and into the 20th with the rise of the sanitary awakening and bacteriology, so too did the effectiveness of interventions intended to prevent or reduce the risk of disease. Hand in hand, as the scientific knowledge of the day grew, the foundational services of public health grew to include immunization, sanitation, environmental regulation, health education, and individual healthcare.

Today, we continue to espouse the importance of foundational public health services as outlined by the Public Health Accreditation Board: communicable disease control; chronic disease and injury prevention; environmental health; maternal, child, and family health; and access to, and linkage with, clinical care. As a local health department, we focus on providing foundational services with the highest return on investment for our community. Activities like providing individualized support for mothers and families at key developmental stages, health education, immunizations against infectious disease, and keeping our environment and places we congregate safe are all essential services that bring significant value to our communities in Darke County. It is our hope, as a local health department, that the collective public health system continues to amass scientific knowledge that shapes the interventions we use to impact the health of our communities, collectively working toward a brighter, healthier future for all Darke Countians.








